What are you hungry for?

What passions or desires guide and occupy your mind, money and energy?

<u>Matthew 5:6</u> "Blessed are those who *hunger* and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled."

Matthew 6:33 "But *seek first* his kingdom and his righteousness"

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The principles and values Jesus calls us to in these three chapters are among the most challenging in the entire Bible! Throughout the whole of the OT, the word 'blessed' meant to be favored, and when you get to the Beatitudes and you see all these, 'blessed', it is describing someone who is favored by God. But think about this, who envies the poor in spirit, who envies those who mourn, the meek, those who are hungering and thirsting ... no one right? Nobody envies the meek. THAT IS UNTIL you realize who the Beatitudes are a description of!

Because *before* the Beatitudes describe what you and I can be, they first describe *who Jesus is*!

Ephesians 1:16- 20 <sup>16</sup> I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. <sup>17</sup> I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. <sup>18</sup> I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, <sup>19</sup> and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength <sup>20</sup> he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead

"Jesus taught his disciples to pray, healed people with prayers, denounced the corruption of the temple worship (which, he said, should be a 'house of prayer'), and insisted that some demons could be cast out only through prayer. He prayed often and regularly with fervent cries and tears (Heb. 5:7), and sometimes all night. The Holy Spirit came upon him and anointed him as he was praying (Luke 3:21–22), and he was transfigured with the divine glory as he prayed (Luke 9:29). When he faced his greatest crisis, he did so with prayer. We hear him praying for his disciples and the

church on the night before he died (John 17:1–26) and then petitioning God in agony in the Garden of Gethsemane. Finally, he died praying."


## 2. "Pray for those who persecute you" -Matthew 5:44
