# How should it shape our lives?

# 1. Remind people that Christians aren't perfect, Jesus is.

Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." – John 14:6

#### 2. It should remind us that we are God's ambassadors.

"You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. <sup>15</sup> Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. <sup>16</sup>In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven. –Matt. 5:14–16

# 3. Be quick to confess our sins.

But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, "Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount." -Luke 18:8
